WALTON Home Movies

WALTON FILMS are available in many different versions and to help you select and order the films you require, please read the following most carefully.

STANDARD 8mm and SUPER 8mm

These are the two kinds of 8mm. film available and it is most important that you choose the right one. The running time and content of a particular title is the same whether it be in Standard-8 or Super-8. But the frame size and sprocket holes are different, and unless you own a projector designed to take both Standard-8 and Super-8 films, you must order Standard-8 films for a Standard-8 projector and Super-8 films for a Super-8 projector. If you are in any doubt as to the type of projector you own, please consult your dealer. Almost all Walton Films are available in Standard-8 and many also in Super-8.

HOW TO SELECT THE VERSION YOU REQUIRE

All films are in BLACK and WHITE only unless stated otherwise.

In order that you may know in what versions a particular title is available, the following symbols are used throughout this catalogue.

StM = Standard-8 Magnetic Sound
SupM = Super-8 Magnetic Sound

St = Standard-8 Silent

16=16mm, Optical Sound

Sup=Super-8 Silent (Note: All these versions are Black and White only).

Where Colour versions are available, the following additional symbols are used.

StMColour = Standard-8 Colour Magnetic Sound. SupMColour = Super-8 Colour Magnetic Sound StColour = Standard-8 Colour Silent SupColour = Super-8 Colour Silent

Where a film is available in Colour and Black and White, the additional symbol B/W is printed as well, e.g. (B.249 1-reel StColour StB/W SupB/W). You will find a key to these symbols printed at the foot of every page.

LENGTHS Walton Films have a number of different lengths. These are printed after the catalogue number. The symbol(s), showing in what versions the particular title is available, are printed after the length. 50ft. films are indicated by a number only, e.g. (295). Longer films have the letter A B C or F before the number, e.g. (A.246).

SOUND FILMS A complete list of all sound films available is shown on page 23.

SILENT FILMS Many of our silent films have been specially shot at 16 f.p.s. Wherever possible silent versions of sound films have been edited so that they can be satisfactorily projected at silent speed. All silent films have descriptive titles.

STAGECOACH

John Ford's epic production starring John Wayne (F.426 8-reel StM SupM)

(A.426 2-reel StM SupM: 1-reel St Sup)

The suspense-packed adventures of a stagecoach making a perilous journey through Indian country. The six passengers, soon to be joined by the Ringo Kid — a fugitive from justice — decide to make the journey alone when their cavalry escort is ordered to return. So begins a thrilling saga — sometimes romantic, always exciting, with every part superbly portrayed by some of the screen's most famous stars.

THE MAN ON THE EIFFEL TOWER

starring Charles Laughton as Inspector Maigret (F.417 8-ree/ StM)

(A.417 2-reel StM SupM: 1-reel StSup)

Action and suspense are the keynotes of this fastmoving thriller set in the streets and cafes of post-war Paris. Inspector Maigret cleverly traps his suspect at the scene of the crime, but the murderer escapes. A furious chase through the streets of Paris reaches its climax in a dizzy climb to the heights of the Eiffel Tower.

TO BE OR NOT TO BE

starring Jack Benny and Carole Lombard

(F.705 8-reel SIM) War-time Comedy Drama centring around a small repertory company in Poland. Warsaw is invaded by the Germans and the actors abandon their performances of Hamlet to play real life characters. They become deeply involved in the complexities of plot and counterplot, spies and counterspies, and make many daring yet amusing impersonations. After a series of hilarious and melodramatic complications, they escape to England, snatched from the very jaws of the Gestapo.

BAR 20

starring William Boyd as Hopalong Cassidy

(F.706 ā-reel StM) (A.489 1-reel StM SupM St Sup) Hoppy and his pals, whilst on a cattle buying trip, come across a stagecoach holdup. They chase off the bandits and discover that the occupants of the stagecoach — now dispossessed of their jewelry — are the people they had come to see. Hoppy and his pals track down the outlaws to their hideout and, after a thrilling gun-fight, capture the ringleader and restore the jewels to their rightful owners.

SUNDOWN

starring George Sanders, Gene Tierney, Bruce Cabot (F.424 8-reel StM) (A.424 2-reel StM SupM: 1-reel St Sup) A story of mystery and intrigue set in the desert wastes of Africa. The discovery by the local commissioner (George Sanders) of a secret arsenal of smuggled foreign guns, and the mysterious disappearance of a beautiful girl (Gene Tierney) from the British military outpost are the curtain raisers to a fierce battle between the savage Shensi tribe and the British troops.

STOOGES GO WEST

(F.380 4-reel SIM SupM) Even the Wild West needs protection when the Three Stooges ride in, disarming the toughest guys with their crazy gags. And the shipment of gold goes through to safety due to the daring of three musketeers of fun!

DISTANT DRUMS

starring Gary Cooper as Captain Wyatt

(F.700 8-reel StM) (A.485 2-reel StM SupM:1-reel St Sup) The sinister beat of the Tom-Tom, the war cry of the hostile Seminole Indians and the almost impenetrable swamps of the Everglades provide the setting for this thrilling adventure story. Captain Wyatt and his small advance party are attacked by Indians. With a handful of survivors he reaches an island hide-out. Surrounded and heavily outnumbered, Wyatt taunts the enemy by challenging the Chief to a death fight. The challenge accepted, the two men engage in a flerce underwater struggle from which Wyatt emerges the victor.

MAN-EATER OF KUMAON

starring Wendell Corey, Sabu, Joanne Page

(F.416 8-reel StM) (A.416 2-reel StM SupM:1-reel St Sup) To the Kumaon jungle of Northern India comes an American — John Collins — to hunt tiger. Man is not the tiger's natural prey, but when injured or infirm, a tiger is often forced to become a man-eater. So when Collins carelessly wounds a tiger, it strikes terror into the hearts of all the villagers. With savage fury it strikes and kills — again and again. Full of remorse, Collins vows that he must destroy the man-eater. Silently and alone he waits his opportunity, and even as he does the hunter himself becomes the hunted.

THE RED STALLION

(F.427 8-reel StM) To save his grandma's ranch from her creditors, young Joel prepares to sell his horse, Red, which has all the makings of a champion. But just before a trial race a wild bear attacks Red and in the fierce battle that follows the bear is killed and the stallion badly injured. The chances of Red now becoming a champion and Joel being able to save the ranch are remote. But fortune favours the brave and all ends happily.

BUCKSKIN FRONTIER

starring Richard Dix

(F.425 4-reel StM) When the tracks of the new Missouri Railroad begin to reach into Kansas, a struggle develops between Jeptha Marr, monarch of a vast wagon empire, and Stephen Bent, builder of the railroad. Marr hires thugs to carry out acts of sabotage, and the conflict is climaxed in a terrific battle between the railroaders and the saboteurs, but Bent's men win. Marr is won over on condition that he is allowed to ride a locomotive when the railroad is completed!

THE KANSAN

starring Richard Dix

(F.423 8-reel StM) (A.423 2-reel StM: 1-reel St) A powerful and dynamic Western in which the Marshal of Broken Lance, Kansas, continually strives for justice against an unscrupulous banker and property owner. To prevent a gang of hired thugs from reaching town, the Marshal dynamites the bridge. Half the gang escape when the bridge goes sky high, and amidst the whine of bullets and gunsmoke the rest fight it out across hastily erected barricades.



TOM BROWN'S SCHOOLDAYS

starring John Howard Davies and Robert Newton

(F.469 8-reel StM SupM) (A.469 2-reel StM SupM) Rugby School in the nineteenth century is very tough and young Tom Brown, in his first term, soon learns this. But he also learns how to stand up to the bullying and brutality which Doctor Arnold, the stern yet humane Headmaster, is slowly trying to stamp out. Tom's courage is rewarded with warm friendship and the knowledge that he and his closest pal save the life of a boy weaker than themselves. "Tom Brown's Schooldays", with its thrills and excitement, its pathos and comedy, is a film made with great sincerity and realism. Brilliantly acted, it is an enthralling story that will hold your interest from beginning to end.

DENTIST IN THE CHAIR

starring Bob Monkhouse, Kenneth Connor and Eric Barker

(F.460 8-reel StM SupM) A riotous romp within the walls of a Dental College in which Bob Monkhouse plays the part of a scatter-brained student who unwittingly becomes involved in receiving stolen dental instruments. Kenneth Connor as a likeable smalltime thief is forced to masquerade as a student with ludicrous consequences. In fact the more they try to extricate themselves the deeper involved they become. Packed with well-timed gags and comic action.

THE HI-JACKERS

starring Anthony Booth and Jacqueline Ellis

(F.704 4-reel StM SupM) Fast moving up-to-the-minute crime story of a gang who hijack lorries carrying valuable loads. Terry McKinley, owner lorry driver bound for London with a full load of whisky, stops to give a girl a lift. Presently he stops again, this time to give assistance after a car 'accident'. HI-JACKED! Who tipped off the gang? Was it the girl? Was it someone in the roadside cafe? That's what the police and Terry want to know.

HISTORY IS MADE AT NIGHT

starring Charles Boyer and Jean Arthur

(F.463 8-reel StM) (A.463 2-reel StM) With the knowledge that his wife and her lover are aboard his new transatlantic liner, the owner radios the captain to break all speed records — in spite of dense fog! With hesitation and rejuctance, the order is given. FULL STEAM AHEAD! Tense moments and frightening scenes of panic are to follow as the great ship crashes into an iceberg. THE GLASS MOUNTAIN

starring Michael Denison and Dulcie Gray

(F.475 8-reel StM) (A.475 2-reel StM SupM) The emotional story of a young composer who. estranged from his wife, returns to Italy to complete his opera. Inspired by the Legend of the Glass Mountain but tormented by the memory of the beautiful young partisan who rescued him during the war, Richard conducts the first performance at the Venice Festival. But success is clouded by heartache and near tragedy. The haunting music and the magnificent voice of Tito Gobbi help to make this an unforgettable film.

WHERE HAS POOR MICKEY GONE ?

featuring Warren Mitchell (star of "Till Death Us Do Part")

(F.464 4-reel StM SupM) Out for kicks, four young thugs break into a warehouse full of carnival novelties. They tie up the elderly owner and smash up some of his equipment. Discovering that he is a magician, they force him to put on a show and he performs his greatest trick! In a spine-chilling atmosphere of eerie mysticism, he makes them disappear - one by one - including the tough leader of the gang, Mickey. Did they really disappear - where has poor Mickey gone?

DARK WATERS

starring Merle Oberon and Franchot Tone

(F.453 8-reel StM) (A.453 2-reel StM) A thrilling, edge-of-seat drama set in the steamy swamplands of Louisiana revolving round a girl first haunted by the fear that she is going insane, and then by the belief that she is going to be murdered. The teaming of Bela (Dracula) Lugosi and Mother ("Queen" of Slapstick) Riley provides just the right combination of sinister suspense and wild comedy.

NOT WANTED ON VOYAGE

(F.474 8-reel StM) (A.474 2-reel StM SupM) A farcical comedy about a cruise to Tangier with Ronald Shiner and Brian Rix as a pair of stewards continually getting into trouble even when they are trying to be helpful. And when a widow "loses" her £50,000 diamond in the ship's swimming pool, they try a spot of crime detection with highly amusing



HELPMATES

(A.319 1-reel St) Wild parties in the Hardy home during his wife's absence have left their aftermath. Laurel responds quickly to an urgent call for help when Mrs. Hardy's return becomes imminent. It's a bedlam of crazy buffoonery as Laurel tries to clean up, with Hardy getting ready to meet

SWISS MISS

(F.702 6-reel StM) Hoping to make a fortune with their patent mouse-trap, Laurel and Hardy arrive in Switzerland. After some extremely funny happenings, they make a sale but are paid with out-of-date currency. They install themselves in a posh hotel, but are soon put to work in the kitchen — washing up and, of course, breaking the dishes. (A.310 1-reel St) Involved in a quarrel between a lass and her tough bullying suitor, Laurel and Hardy skilfully rescue the damsel in distress. Encouraged by their success, Laurel is signed up to box an unknown opponent — in fact the big bully! It's the craziest fight you could ever see, with Laurel

THICKER THAN WATER

(A.315 1-reel St) Together they go to an auction sale, but the mugs bid against each other. To make matters worse, their acquisition never reaches home. As soon as Mrs. Hardy finds out, she gives her husband such a clout that he ends up in hospital needing a blood transfusion. And when Laurel becomes a blood donor, it just goes to show that blood is thicker than water!

LIVE GHOST

(A.316 2-reel StM SupM:1-reel St Sup) Laurel and Hardy are bribed into shanghaieing a ship's crew, but the two chumps are shanghaied themselves. 

Lady Clarissa Rohan, married, but far from loved; Hester, the scheming "other woman" with her eye on the Marquis of Rohan, and Peter Rokeby, an \$167, 95 adventurer who at last finds real love. These are the characters in a tale of romance, jealousy and lust, in an age when honour and chivalry were still a part of life and a duel settled such affairs in a most permanent fashion.

THE NIGHT CALLER 72 MIN

John Saxon, Patricia Haines and Maurice Denham star in this top rate thriller, A massive object hurtling towards Earth is tracked down to the surface and a hunt for the inevitable crater begins. The ever wary defence forces, concerned that it may have come from some unfriendly power on Earth, are soon confronted with a much greater concern by the death of one of the scientists aiding them. BRIEF ENCOUNTER 72 MIN

Noel Coward's tender love story starring Trevor Howard and Celia Johnson, A chance meeting in a railway station refreshment room between a housewife and a doctor shortly after World War II, their falling in love and realization that \$133.95 already being married would never permit such a situation. A film that brilliantly portrays the realities of life, be it when Noel Coward wrote the story, or today, with reality much truer than fiction.

THE ONE THAT GOT AWAY 90 MIN

The true story of Franz Von Wera, a German air ace. Captured after crash landing his fighter aircraft in England, he was the only prisoner-of-war who succeeded in getting back to Germany to fight again. He escaped three times, First, when he eluded his guards, but the inhospitable weather of the Lake District and a determined search led to his recapture. The second attempt was through a tunnel with four compatriots. Von Wera convinced both police and railway officials that he \$167, 95 was a Dutch Pilot, and but for the suspicions of a junior RAF Officer, he would have got away in a stolen Hurricane Fighter. The third escape, perhaps the most audacious, was from a train en route to a Canadian P.O.W. camp. In our arctic like winter weather he eventually crossed the partly frozen St. Lawrence to reach the still neutral U.S.A.

DOOMWATCH 75 Min COLOUR

George Sanders, Ian Bannen and Judy Geeson star in this topical Horror/Drama. The unusual and inhospitable treatment afforded a visitor to a small coastal \$259.95 island, a local child's death and the disappearance of the body, then another death, are just the first occurences in a story too true for comfort,

THE THIRD MAN 104 Min

Orson Welles, Joseph Cotton and Trevor Howard star in the haunting account of the mysterious Harry Lime. "The well known theme music adds much to the relentless hold of this classic set in post war Vienna.
